MUNICIPAL PUBLIC QUESTION

Shall the Township of Hampton be authorized to establish a Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP) for its volunteer fire and rescue members serving the township pursuant to the standards established by State Law and Township Ordinance?

EXPLANATORY STATEMENT

A LOSAP program enhances the ability of the Township of Hampton to attract and retain members of Hampton Township Fire and Rescue, Inc. Under the program, the township, as sponsoring agency, would make annual contributions on behalf of each deferred income account administered under State law. To be eligible, a volunteer member must earn at least 41 points, in a calendar year for participation in various emergency service activities as established by Hampton Township Ordinance #2009-08, and have five years vested in the program. A maximum contribution of \$1,150.00 per year would be made by the township on behalf of each member. The estimated cost of the program is based on the 2009 Municipal Tax Rate and has been calculated to be \$132,250.00, which would be equivalent to approximately 3.4 Tax Points or an increase of approximately \$51.00 on a house assessed at \$150,000.00; \$68.00 on a house assessed at \$200,000.00; \$85.00 on a house assessed at \$250,000.00.

MUNICIPAL PUBLIC QUESTION #1

Shall the ordinance adopted by the Sparta Township Council on May 12, 2009 entitled “AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER VI, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE CONTROL, OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SPARTA” be ratified?

INTERPRETIVE STATEMENT

A “YES” vote will authorize the Sparta Township Council to amend the existing Alcoholic Beverage Control Ordinances, specifically Ordinance Section 6-3.4, in order to allow for plenary retail distribution licenses.

MUNICIPAL PUBLIC QUESTION #2

Shall the Township of Sparta establish a Length of Service Awards Program for the volunteer first aid squad members that serve the Township in accordance with the following terms and conditions:

- a. The program shall provide for annual contributions to a deferred income account for each active volunteer member that meets the eligibility criteria and in accordance with the schedule adopted by the Township of Sparta.
- b. The proposed maximum annual contribution for an active volunteer member is \$500 for the year 2010; \$800 for the year 2011; and \$1,150 for the year 2012. Thereafter the maximum amount is set by statute and it is subject to periodic increases that are tied to the Consumer Price Index. The permitted maximum amount will be issued annually, according to the Emergency Services Volunteer Length of Service Act.
- c. The estimated cost of the program has been calculated as follows: \$40,000 for the year 2010, \$64,000 for the year 2011; and \$92,000 for the year 2012.

INTERPRETIVE STATEMENT

The Township of Sparta has decided to create a Length of Service Awards Program (“LOSAP”) for members of the first aid squad that serves the citizens of the Township of Sparta. The general requirements for a LOSAP are set forth in State law (N.J.S.A. 40A:14-183, et seq.). The award program would be by way of an annual contribution to a deferred compensation program for all qualifying members. Members of the Sparta Township First Aid Squad would earn points for organization related activities, and they would qualify for the maximum annual contribution upon earning one hundred (100) points per year. For the year 2010, the proposed maximum annual contribution for each qualifying member of the Sparta Township First Aid Squad is five hundred dollars (\$500) and the proposed estimated total amount to be budgeted in the Township of Sparta in the year 2010 for the program is forty thousand dollars (\$40,000). For the year 2011, the proposed maximum annual contribution for each qualifying

member of the First Aid Squad is eight hundred dollars (\$800) and the proposed estimated total amount to be budgeted in the Township of Sparta for the year 2011 for the program is sixty four thousand dollars (\$64,000). The proposed maximum annual contribution for each qualifying member of the First Aid Squad is one thousand one hundred fifty dollars (\$1,150) for the year 2012 for the program and the proposed estimated amount to be budgeted is ninety two thousand dollars (\$92,000). Details on the program may be found in the Ordinance adopted by the Township of Sparta, which is available for public inspection, along with a copy of the State enabling law at the Municipal Building, 65 Main Street, Sparta, New Jersey, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m.

NJ STATE QUESTION:

GREEN ACRES, WATER SUPPLY AND FLOODPLAIN PROTECTION, AND FARMLAND AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION BOND ACT OF 2009

Shall the "Green Acres, Water Supply and Floodplain Protection, and Farmland and Historic Preservation Bond Act of 2009," which authorizes the State to issue bonds in the amount of \$400 million to provide moneys for (1) the acquisition and development of lands for recreation and conservation purposes, including lands that protect water supplies, (2) the preservation of farmland for agricultural or horticultural use and production, (3) the acquisition, for recreation and conservation purposes, of properties that are prone to or have incurred flood or storm damage, and (4) funding historic preservation projects; and providing the ways and means to pay the interest on the debt and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof, with full public disclosure of all spending, be approved?

GREEN ACRES, WATER SUPPLY AND FLOODPLAIN PROTECTION, AND FARMLAND AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION BOND ACT OF 2009

Approval of this act would authorize \$400 million in funding for Green Acres, water supply and floodplain protection, and farmland and historic preservation projects through the sale of State general obligation bonds. The Green Acres program acquires land that protects water supplies and preserves open space, including parks, fish and wildlife habitat, and flood prone or affected areas. It also funds park improvements and facilities. Of the total sum authorized: (1) \$218 million will be used for Green Acres; (2) \$146 million will be used for farmland preservation purposes; (3) \$24 million will be used for the "Blue Acres" program by which the State may purchase from willing sellers, for open space preservation purposes, properties that are prone to or have incurred flood or storm damage; and (4) \$12 million will be used for historic preservation purposes. All spending of the authorized bond proceeds will be subject to full public disclosure.
